## Dear Dean Compton:

FIRE<sup>1</sup> and EFF<sup>2</sup> are concerned about a potential threat to student rights at Dartmouth's Geisel School of Medicine, where several students face discipline for allegedly having accessed relevant material on the school's e-curriculum platform while actively taking exams.

EFF's technologists have reviewed the technical materials provided by the university and take issue with its analysis. EFF's research indicates that any device through which a student is logged into the e-curriculum platform will continue to make connections to that platform using automatic syncing (also known as AJAX), even if that device is locked and not in use.

Dartmouth apparently interprets any connection logs as evidence that the student was actively utilizing the e-curriculum platform, rather than merely having another device passively logged into the platform, such as a cell phone or separate computer.

Dartmouth has likely turned false positives into accusations of academic misconduct, taking enforcement action against innocent students based on faulty technical evidence, rather than relying on dispositive evidence that the students were making active use of any external materials.

Our organizations strongly suggest the college more thoroughly review the details of each case, with the support of outside technologists, before making any disciplinary decisions. Students facing misconduct charges must also be provided due process, consistent with Dartmouth College policy, during these disciplinary proceedings. To the extent that Dartmouth has already imposed discipline on any student—including through any student's waiver of their rights to contest the allegations against them—we call on Dartmouth to rescind those sanctions pending a thorough review of the evidentiary basis of the allegations.

Given the urgent nature of this matter, we request receipt of a response to this letter no later than the close of business on Friday, April 2, 2021.
